I.

*Of all Aches in generall.*



**T**Ake young red Sage and  
Rue ana i lb, yong Bay  
leavs iij ℥, Wormwood  
viij ℥, wash them not,  
shred them smal, Sheeps  
sewet hot out of the  
Sheepe iij lb, mixe the  
sewet and hearbs toge-  
ther, beating them in a Morter by a little at  
once with the hearbs, till it be ali green, and  
no white seen of the sewet; then mixe all in  
B a Pan

a Pan with your hand in one pottle of oyle, then cover the Pan close, and set it in some private place for eight dayes, then boyle it simpering, stil stirring it with a spatula; whē it is halfe boyled, adde thereto oyle of Spike *iiij ℥*: when it is boyled enough drop one drop on a bright Sawcer, it will be very greene, then it is well boyled; then straine it out very close, rub the small of the backe therewith, it helpeth the Stone as much as a Pease, put into the eare with black wooll, cureth all griefes thereof, and all Aches are cured therewith.

## II.

*How to cure old Aches.*

**T**Ake oyle of Turpentine *d i ℔*, oyle of Bayes *iiij ℥*, Mace, Cloves, Nutmegs, Cinnamon ana *i ℥*, oyle of Spike *i ℥*, Juniper berries *viiij ℥*, Castor Euforbium ana *i ℥*, Brocks grease *iiij ℥*, Mummy *i ℥ d.* digest them for one moneth in horse-dung, then distill them artificially, and anoynt the grieve therewith.



III.

*Aches in Bones or Joynts, the Cure.*

**T**Ake blacke knobs of the Ash-tree in the Spring time, grinde them small, and boyle them over a soft fire with fresh Butter in an earthen pot sufficiently; then take them from the fire, let them coole, and keepe them close stopped; then take as many of Broome flowers in May, grinde them as the other, then mixe them all together, and boyle them againe with a quarter of a pinte of Malmsey, then keepe it to anoynt the grieffe therewith.

IIII.

*Aches or Lamenesse in Members or Joynts.*

Take oyle of Exeter, Aquavitæ, and Oxe-Gall ana part. æquales; mix them together in a great bladder, shaking them well; anoynt therewith warm twice a day till you are wel.

V.

*Aches in any Member.*

**B**Oyle Oxe-gall, Aquavitæ, of each a like in a Pipkin, scum it, and therewith a-

noynt the Member grieved with great labor and hardnesse ; then cover it warme with a peece of Fur till it be well.

### VI.

*Another for the same.*

**B**Oyle fresh Butter not salted in Malme-  
sey, bathe the grieve very hot therewith,  
make it up warme as before.

### VII.

*An Oyle that cureth all Aches in Man or Beast.*

**T**Ake of pure Sope ii ℥, Aquavitæ iii ℥,  
liquid Storax ii ℥, and boyle the Aqua-  
vitæ, and boyle the other Simples therein,  
stirring it with a spoon til it come to a thick  
Unguent; anoynt the grieve therewith twice  
a day, rubbing it very wel, and cover it warm  
with Fur or Cotten.

### VIII.

*An Unguent for Ache, Bruise, or Spraine.*

**T**Ake Rue, Vervayne, Dill, selfe-heale  
Yarrowe, Mugwort, Comfrey, Adders  
tongue, red Sage, red Fennell, red Nettles,  
red Dock-leaves, Valeryan, and Carduus Be-  
nedictus

nedictus ana M:ii. bruise all these in a Morter, boyle them in ℥.i d. of May Butter for a quarter of an houre, still stirring it; adde thereto oyle of Exeter, oyle of Dill ana i ℥, let them boyle one walme more, first straine out the hearbs, then boyle the oyles, and annoynt therewith.

IX.

*For any Ague falne into the Legs and Swolne,  
the Cure.*

**T**AKE Plantain, Marigolds, Houndstongu, S. Johns Wort, Bettony, red Fennell, Southistle, Dandelion, Smallage, and Plumtree-leaves ana M i: shred them with Wheat-meale, then seeth them in hot Cowes milke to a Plaister, so apply it: this will dissolve the humour and digest it, by the serositie of the blood: approved.

X.

*Assajmus or Numnesse in Joynts or elsewhere, to Cure.*

**L**ET the Patient drinke every morning fasting one ℥ of Camphire in a draught of Bettony-water, wherein infuse some Stœchados: this cureth in one Moneth with the use thereof.

## XI.

*Argentum vivum to Mortifie.*

**F**irst beat at Almond in your Morter, then put thereinto so much powder of Verdigrase as a Beane, then put in your Quick-silver with a spoonfull of strong Vinegar; incorporate them all well together: this will Mortifie it well for any use.

## XII.

*Apoplex, to Cure.*

**T**Ake Melilot, Pennyryall, Wilde Tyme, Marjorum Balme, Marjorum gentill ana i M: boyle them in water, and bathe or foment the head therewith warme; stampe the hearbs, put to them oyle of Rue, and of Lillies ana i ℥, apply them warme to the head, if the weather be cold then anoynt the head with warme oyles, as oyle of Dill, Bevercod, or Pyretrum, or such like; not onely the Head, but also the Necke and whole Back.

## XIII.

*A Salve for the Apoplex.*

**T**Ake Calamus Costus roots ana iiij ℥, Siler, or siler Mountain, Bazill seed ana iiij ℥  
melt

melt and boyle all these together on a small fire of Charcoale in white wine, untill the Wine be consumed; then mix the oyles with it, and anoynt the whol Head and the back-bone all the length thereof down to the ends: If this cure not, then shave all the Head and apply this Plaister following, Spread on a peece of Leather, that all the Head may be covered therewith: Take Galbanum, Saganum, Opoponax ana i ℥, Aloes succotirn i ℥, Turpentine i ℥, melt them and mix them together to a Plaister.

XIV.

*Aqua Composita, good for Head, Memory,  
and all Diseases.*

**T**AKE the roots of Saxifrage and the leavs, Parsley, Alexanders, Fennell, Tyme, Hysope, Pennyryal, Rosemary, Lavander, Primroses, Mints, Origan, Sage, Calamint, Avence Bettony, Savine, Pennyryall, Lettice and Violets ana one small handfull, then take Galingale, Pepper of both sorts, small and long, Cloves, Mace, Nutmegs ana i ℥, Cynamon, Cubebs, Setwall, Pellitory of Spain, Lignum Aloes ana i ℥ di. stampe small the Hearbs, and pound the Spices, then infuse them all night in six quarts of red Wine, the

next day distill them in a Lymbeck, so is it finished.

XV.

*Another Aqua Composita.*

**T**AKE Wormewood ii M. Enula Campana a great root, iii Crops of Horehound, Mints, Parsley, and Centory ana i M. Infuse all these powdered & bruised in three gallons of strong Ale or Wine Lees, adde thereto of Annis seeds and Lycorice ana iiii ℥, bruised with some powder of Ireos and Calamus Aromat, distill them as before is set downe.

XVI.

*Ague or burning Feaver, to coole or helpe*

**M**AKE a Poffet of new Milk and Butter-milke of a pottle, take off the Curd, let the patient drink so much thereof cold as he can, use it two or three times, it cooleth the body, and taketh away the fit.

*Item,* After the Poffet-Ale is digested, let him to comfort his stomacke drinke Mace-Ale made with small Ale.

*Item,* also let him eate either great Peares or Wardens cold being baked; they comfort the stomack, and coole the body.

*Ague,*

XVII.

*Ague, a Medicine to binde to the Wrist, to  
Cure it.*

**M**ake a Plaister of Leather fit for the  
wrist, pricked full of holes, and spread  
it over with Venice Turpentine; then strew  
it all over with powder of Rue and Fran-  
kincence ana, mixe as much as will sticke  
thereon, lay it to the wrist a little before  
the fit commeth, and let it lye untill the fit  
be gone.

XVIII.

*Ague hot, a cooling Julyp.*

**M**undifie French Barley i M. then boyle  
it in a gallon of Raine water, put  
therein Rayfins of the Sunne stoned iiii ℥,  
Damaske Prunes iij ℥, boyle them to the  
consumption of halfe, then straine it hard  
out and put them to the fire againe, and put  
therein Succory, Violet leaves, Sanickle,  
Spinage, Strawberry leaves, Borage, Colts-  
foot, Maydenhaire, Buglosse, Liverwort,  
Sinckfoyle, Endive, Longwort leaves and  
Ribwort ana di. M. cut somewhat small, and  
boyled till halfe be consumed, then straine it  
hard, for they commix therewith syrups of  
Vinegar

Vinegar, the syrops of Lemmons and Roses ana iii ℥, drinke thereof cold at any time, it both cooleth and comforteth very much.

XIX.

*Ague to heale both in old and young, proved.*

**M**Ake a quart of Posset Ale of Milk and Ale, then take the yong tops of Rosemary, Marigolds, Plantine, and young Bay-leaves ana ii ℥, cut them small, and boyle them in the posset Ale, until al their strength be forth, and drinke a great draught thereof warme a little before the fit commeth, and sweat upon it; doe this some three times, it will cure, being proved on many.

XX.

*Aromaticum Rosatum, which healeth the weaknesse of the stomacke, comforteth all parts of the Body, cleanseth corrupt humors in the Breast, comforteth the Braine and Heart, and causeth good digestion.*

**T**Ake pure red Roses fifteen ℥, Lycorice mundified i ℥, lignum Aloes, and yellow Sanders ana iii ℥, Cinamon five ℥, Mace and Cloves ii ℥ d. gum Dragant ii ℥ di. Nutmegs, grains of Paradise and Galingale i ℥, Spike-nard,



nard, Ambergreece and Muske ana di. ʒ,  
white Sugar as much as sufficeth, & dissolve  
altogether in syrup of Roses.

XXI.

*Ague Tertian, the Cure.*

**T**Ake Burre roots i ʒ, three cornes of long  
Pepper, stampe the roots and Pepper,  
boyle them in a pinte of Ale with ii ʒ of  
Treacle, till halfe be wasted, drink it warme  
and sweat two houres.

XXII.

*Ague or Feaver hot, a Julyp.*

**T**Ake Succory, Endive, Violets and Borage  
ana M i : Fennell-roots pithed i M, Ly-  
corice mundified i ʒ, French Barley ii ʒ, boyl  
them in a gallon of water to a pottle, and  
drinke thereof, it cooleth much.

XXIII.

*Ague Tertian, the Cure.*

**T**Ake nine young red Sage leaves, nine  
sprigs of Yarrow, three Bay leaves, three  
sprigs of Rue, boyle all these in one pinte  
of Posset Ale, to the consumption of a third  
part, then straine it hard, let the Patient  
drink

drinke a good draught thereof very hot before the fit come, and sweat well after it; use this three times.

XXIII.

*Ague Tertian, the Cure.*

**T**Ake dry Orange Pils, Nutmegs, roche Allom ana iiii ℥, ten Cloves, all powdered together; give of this powder to the sicke as much as will lye on a shilling, to drinke in three spoonfuls of Wine Vinegar, two houres before the fit cometh; if you take therewith Bezor three graines, it is the better; then take nine roots of Mayden weede for a Man, and six for a Woman, put in a little bagge, and hanged nine dayes about the Patients necke, and six dayes about a Womans necke, then burne the bag and roots, and let the Patient be purged.

XXV.

*Ache, Griefe or Paine, an Unguent, the Cure.*

**T**Ake Cammomint, Mallowes, Sage, Dill and Marigold-leaves ana i M, stampe them and boyle them in Malmsey and Linseed-oyle ana di. pinte, and fresh Butter out of the Churn i ℥, let them be well boyled, strain them, and anoynt therewith.

## XXVI.

*For an Ague, sore in Knee or Joynt, for swelling  
or Sciatica.*

**F**Ry Alehouse with fresh Butter in a fry-  
ing pan, till it be soft, and not too moist,  
apply it very hot to the grief or swelling till  
it be well, renew it every twenty four hours.

## XXVII.

*Ague or Feaver of Phlegm, Diary or Quotidian.*

**T**Ake red Roses, Ivory, Buglos flowers, Co-  
riander, Orenge pils ana iij ℥, infuse them  
in Vinegar and white wine ana iij ℥, of Pe-  
nides i ℔, of Sugar or Honey i ℔ di. Your  
Syrup, if the Stomack be empty or weak, or  
the Guts empty, then put in all Wine and  
no Vinegar: this is an excellent Syrup for  
either, by adding or diminishing Simples  
hereunto, according to the Infirmities, and  
nature thereof, it may serve for any grosse  
matter in any cold distemper.

## XXVIII.

*Pils of excellent vertue to purge all Phlegma-  
tick Feavers or Agues.*

**T**Ake Agarick, Aloes, Acorus, Turbith,  
ana i ℥, Esula di. Coloquintida i grain,  
salt

salt Gem Maltick, Ginger, Wormwood, Lettice, Raysons mundified, Bdellium ana  $\text{iiij} \text{z}$ , let Syrup of Roses be made up with these Pils, the Dos is  $\text{ij} \text{z}$  more or lesse, according to the Patients strength, give them after you have used the other Syrup ix dayes to digest it: These be good in any Tertian Ague, if you adde to them this following in any Phlegmatick Feavers or Diseases, *viz.*

*Item,* Rubarb,  $\text{ij} \text{z}$ , Spikenard  $\text{di.} \text{z}$ , Diagridij, Mastick ana  $\text{i} \text{z}$ , mix these with the aforesaid, the Dos is  $\text{di.} \text{z}$ , more or lesse as the strength of the Patient is, and the vehemency of the Feaver.

X XIX.

*The poor man's Cure for his Fever.*

**F**irst digest the Humour with Oxymell Compositum, then purge the inner Bark of an Elder, an Eg-shell full, or lesse, according to the Patients strength, in a draught of Wine, Posset-Ale, or any thing else warm; when he is purged, give him Aurea Alexandria, with Wine wherein Sage hath been sodden, give it many times.

## XXX.

*Ague or Feaver Quartan of Melancholly.*

**F**irst digest the matter with Oximell simplex, or with the Decoction of Senna Epithinum, and Harts tongue, after that use some Oximell Diureticum, then purge with Diasena Diaboraginis sharped with Lapis Lazuli, and sometimes purge with Hierarufie, and thus by little and little proceed: Or take Violet flowers, Borage, Sena, Time, the juyce of Fumitory and Lycorice, make your Decoction of Whay, infuse therein some Elder bark, then adde thereto iii. sorts of Myrabolanies ana iiii ℥, stirred together on a soft fire, and after the straining, adde to it Lapis Acivenius nine times quenched in the same Decoction, and i ℥ thereof made in subtill powder; minister this before day.

## XXXI.

*For the Feaver Quartan.*

**T**His Feaver is cured by giving every morning i ℥ of Calamint fasting, with Triacle di, Myrrh di, if need be to comfort the Stomack, adde thereto some juyce of Mints; this given many times together, hath

hath cured many after the Body is well purged.

XXXII.

*Ague or Feaver Tertian.*

**T**He true Tertian is caused of burnt choler mixed with other Humours, which happeneth most to young people in Summer time, else it is no true Tertian, though it come of red choler, for choler when it is putrified in the veins, causeth a continuall Feaver, if without the veins it maketh a Tertian; if putrified in two places, it maketh a double Tertian: A Tertian beginneth with rigour like the pricking of Needles, and endeth with vaporious sweat.

XXXIII.

*The Cure.*

**T**Ake of Endive, Succory both kinds, ana iiii ℥, the four cold seeds ana i ℥, flowers of Violets, Borage, and water Lillies ana ii ℥, red Roses iiii ℥, Sugar i lb, make your Syrup, and digest it with this, then purge as followeth.

*Cankers inward or outward to cure.*

**R**oste Sorrell clesed of the stalks and strings, take onely the pure leafe in a wet brown paper in the Embers when it is soft, mix therewith halfe so much honey, as much Wheat flower, and as much burnt Allom, compound all these together in a Morter to a plaister, apply it to the grieffe cold, if the Grieffe be inward Minister three Pills thereof morning and evening; wash the Sore with a Lotion made of Plantaine water, burnt Allom, and so much calcined Vitriall as will make it blood-red.

LXXXVI.

*Cramp in Arme or Legge, the Cure.*

**T**Ake great Onions, roast them, make a Plaister thereof, and lay it warm about the joynt as hot as he can suffer it, dresse it three times, and cured.

LXXXVII.

*Canker or Pock ia any part of the Body to Cure.*

**M**ix the fine powder of Mercury with the powder of Bole, Mix it so that the colour be very pale, this killeth either of these griefes.

XCII.

*Deafnesse to cure.*

**T**Ake Oyl of Castor ii ℥, oyl of Roses, and oyl of bitter Almonds ana i ℥, Aquavilæ ii ℥, mix altogether, and boyl it till the Aquavitæ be consumed, then every night to Bedwards, drop four drops one after another in the Ear, stop it with Cotten that smelleth of Musk.

XCIX.

*Another.*

**T**Ake a spoonfull of the Liquor that fryes out of a green Ashen Bough burning in the fire, and the oyl of a silver Eele ana, of the Gall of a Hare, and black Honey ana, one spoonfull of Singreen, boyl them altogether, and drop a little in your Ear, as need requireth.

*Diseases many and generall, an Electuary.*

**T**Ake red Rose leaves dryed, red Coral, Guiacum, Acorus, Carroway seed, Ivory, Cinamon, Bole armoniack, Egshels all dryed, Rosemary powdred ana ii ℥, Nutmegs, Cloves aud Mace ana i ℥, Sugar powdred

hundred iii ℥, juice of Plantain, Knotgrasse, Shep-  
 heard's purse, Houfleeke young Bramble tops,  
 and Sorrell ana i M, or so much of the juices  
 as will make it up an Electuary, take one  
 spoonful therof morning and evening warm.  
 If it be for the Gonorrhœa, first fumigate him  
 upon a close stool with Frankincense, it stay-

**T**Ake Mechoacan, Sugar, Diagredii, Ru-

 all these be fine powdered, the Dosis i ℥ in  
 white Wine or posset Ale three dayes toge-  
 ther : Then take Hyfop, Violets, Rosemary,  
 Verven, Bettony, St Johns woort, Mouse-  
 ear, Plantain, Avenge, Sage, Fetherfew  
 ana i M. wash them clean, then dry them,  
 and bruise them in a Morter, then put it in a

Parsley roots, Eringo roots, Fennell roots, all bruised ana two ℥, Parsley and Fennell-seeds bruised ana ii ℥; put all these in a Pipkin close covered, put upon them as much scalding water as will cover them, then put it up and paste it close, so let it stand in hot Embers and not boyle xxiiij houres, then put all these in a Ferkin of new Ale of seven gallons, so let it worke together till the Ale be stale; drink no other drink during the cure, drinke this at all times.

*Deafenesse, a precious Medicine.*

**T**Ake Honey, the juyce of Singreene, the  
Water that droppeth from a greene

C VII.

*A Defensive to stay Impostumes or Inflammations from all green Wounds, apply it both sides the Wound.*

**T**Ake the white of two Eggs well brayed, put thereto Wheat flower, powder of Bole armoniack, and powder of Sanguis Draconis, mix all these well together, and apply it as before, this stayeth and repercusseth all humours: if any heat happen in the wound, then adde thereto Vinegar, Rose water, Singreen, or Plantain juice, this will dissolve all Inflammations or heat quickly.

C VIII.

*A Defensive for green Wounds.*

**T**Ake oyl of Roses, Bole armoniack ana ii ℥, Terra sigillata, and Vinegar ana i ℥, Camphire ii d. Nightshade and Singreen ana i M. beat the Hearbs, strain the juices, mix all together cold, so apply it; if it be too thin, thicken it with Barley meal.

*Dropsies, Pox, Consumption, or any

**T**ake a pinte of spirit of Wine, infuse therein Zarza perilla thinne sliced, so much as will colour the spirit of wine yellow as gold, then dissolve in it Gum of Guajacum ij ℥, strain it, and adde thereto naturall Balme di. ℥, take thereof one spoonfull in a draught of small Beere or Ale morning and evening till you be well.

## CX.

*Diascordium, an excellent Cordial to make.*

**T**ake Cinnamon, Lignum Cassiæ ana iij ℥, Scordid or water Germander j ℥ Dittany or Candy, Tormentill, Bistorta or Snakeweed ana iiii ℥ Galbanum, Arabis, or Candy Mustard-seed i ℥ di. Gentian iiii ℥, Bolarmoniack i ℥ di. Terra Linnen iiii ℥, Opium i ℥ di. Storax, Calamint iiii ℥ di. Sorrell-seed i ℥ di. long Pepper, Ginger ana ii ℥, pure Honey ii ℔ di ℔. Conserve of red Roses i ℔. Aromaticall Wine di ℔, boyle all these two walmes to an Electuary.

## CXI.

*Eyes red and watring, the Cure.*

**S**pread the white of a new layd Egge on a red Colewort leafe when you goe to bed, plaister the eyes therewith ; or the gall of a Partridge, or the gall of a Turtle put into the eyes helpeth the dimnesse.

## CXII.

*Eyes that seeme blind, the Cure.*

**T**ake Smallage, red Fennell, Rew, Ver-vine, Egrimony, Bettony, Sage, Sinkfoyle, Pimpernell, Eufrage, Celendine, ana i M. wash them and stamp them well, put them in some vessell; take powder of xv. pepper corns well searced, one pint of wine, three spoonfals of boyes urine that is very young, boyle them together till the juyce of the hearbs be in the wine, then straine it out hard, and put it a Viall close stopped, and with a feather drop it in the eyes cold for fifteen dayes ; during the Cure, drink Beere wherein is infused over night (to drink next morning) Tormentill and penny-grasse.

**T**Ake Verdigrease iiii ℥, powdered Al-  
lomij ℥ Vinegar vi ℥, Honey i ℥, boyl

*Emrods, the Cure.*

**T**Ake two Hankerchiefes viij double,  
put them on a Chafingdish of coles in  
a dish of white wine, ready to boy le  
or feething hot, then wring out one of them  
herd, and lay it on the grieſe as hot as hee  
can ſuffer it, let it ſo lye till it waxeth cold,  
then put that in the diſh, and ſo doe one af-  
ter another, for halfe an houre at once; uſe  
this till it be well, which will be ſome three  
times; during the Cure ſome drink Milk-

Or take the powder of burn'd Anniseeds, Honey, and Saffron, make a plaister thereof, and lay it to the grieve, every dressing wash it with white wine wherein Scabius hath boyled.

## C X V I.

*Emrods to Cure.*

1 TAKE the juyce of the root of the great Burre, boyle it, and bathe the Emrods therewith very hot, then presently strew thereon the powder of red Archangell.

2 Or take the powders of Lovage and Rew mixed with Honey, make a plaister thereof and use it.

3 Also boyle the leaves of Mercury very tender, apply it thereto as a poultis very hot, dresse it twice a day and be whole.

4 If they bleed or water much, cast on them the fine powder of Lethrage of gold, it dryeth them.

5 Or stamp unset Leeks small, put there to honey and flower, lay it on warm.

6 Or stamp in a dish of the best Sops with some garden Snailes without shells.

## CXVII.

*Eyes to preserve by Medicines Locall.*

1 **T**He smell of Marjorum is good to  
preserve the sight, to drinke Ey-  
bright in Ale, Beere, or Wine, with the  
juyce of Fennell, is very good, and no-  
thing better; the powder of Eybright in a  
reare Egge, or in any thing else is also  
good: Good Spectacles much helpeth:  
Cinnamon, Cloves, Nutmeggs, Mace,  
and Pepper, are all good. Also the water  
of Eybright, Fennell, Marigold, Perle-  
wort, or any of these put into the eyes,  
cureth.

2 *Item*, Vervine gathered young in May,  
put in a Vyall close stopped, and so let it  
stand till it putrifie, and a juyce sinking  
to the bottome of the Glasse, wherewith  
drop it into your eyes, it helpeth all blind-  
nesse in man or beast.

3 *Item*, In Aprill gather the finest Fen-  
nell, put it into a Glasse with a long nar-  
row neck some fifteene dayes, then take the

glasse softly for troubling it, powre out the clearest thereof to another glasse to every di ſſ thereof, put i ʒ of Lignum Aloes fine powdred, and let it ſo ſtand fifteene dayes more, then ſtraine it twice to cleare it out; of this drop a little in your eyes, it much cleareth the ſight.

4. *Item*, Lignum Aloes diſtilled in a Stillatory of Glasse the water of it put in your eyes, it cleareth the ſight miraculouſly.

*Item*, i ʒ of the diſtilled water of Roſemary flowers, with ij d. of the powder of Salt Gem diſſolved therein, and dropped in the eyes, cureth the ſight, and dryeth all moyſture from thence.

6. *Item*, the urine of a Childe, or the Lye made of Aſhes of Fennell ſtalks, either of them dropped in the eyes, mends the ſight.

## C X V I I I.

*Inner medicine to cleare the Eyes.*

**T**Ake the powder of Eybright iiij ʒ, Mace i ʒ, mix them together, and take the weight of ij d. thereof in Fennell water in the morning, faſting three houres after.

2. Take the juyces of Fennell Vervin, and Roſes ana ij ʒ, Eybright, Endive and Celendine

lendine ana di M: boyle the hearbs in two pints of water till halfe be spent; then with the juyces and the Decoction, boyle it with Sugar to a syrup, take of this syrup ij ʒ, in Eybright water iij ʒ. If the body be windy adde to the aforesaid powders Anniseed and Fennell seeds i ʒ.

CXIX.

*Eyes that have Pearles, a medicine.*

**T**Ake Dazies and the roots, red Fennell and Alehoofe, stamp them together, take the juyces of them, and drop two or three in the contrary Eare warme, on that side the grieve is not, till the Pearle fall off. use this every day morning and evening.

CXX.

*Eyes that have Pearle or Web.*

**T**Ake the white of two new layd Eggs very hard boyled, the shels and yolk being taken away, put the white in a Morter with i d. of fine powder of Copperas, pound them together, then put to it two small spoonfuls of Rose water, then straine it hard throw a linnen cloath into a Glasse, let it settle with the clearest water thereof, drop it in the eyes with a feather.

2 Or take the white of two Egges, very hard sodden, white Sugarcandy i 3, white Copperas i 3, both fine powdred, white Rosewater one spoonfull, stampe the Egges, Sugarcandy and Copperas together, then put the Rosewater thereto, straine it hard into a Glasse, drop thereof three times a day into your eyes.

CXXI.

*Another.*

3 **T**AKE all the head of a blacke Cat burned to Ashes, blow some of that powder with a quill thrice a day into the Eye, if the paine be great, especially in the night, lay thereon some Oaken leaves doubled together, and wet in Rosewater onto the Eye, renew them as need requireth, it cureth.

CXXII.

*Another rare secret for the same.*

4 **T**AKE nine Wormes, you shall finde them in old hollow Timber with many legs, called Hogs or Swines Lice, if you touch them they will be round, stampe them with the juyce of Celendine or Betonie; then straine them well, let the Patient drink

drinke it fasting warme, not eating in two houres after; use this three mornings together, it will cure.

## CXXIII.

*Or thus.*

**T**AKE the white of an Egge, and the juyce of Pelitory of the Wall, beaten together and scummed; one drop of that liquor in the Eye cureth, *Probatum est.*

## CXXIV.

*For the Eyes: The vertue of Tormentill.*

**B**Oyle the hearbe Tormentill and Roots in white Wine, till the third part be spent; let the Blinde drinke of this Potion nine dayes together, a draught in the morning cold, and at night blood-warm, and within that time (God willing) he will recover: if the Eye be hurt, boyle this herbe stamped in white Wine and a little Water, binde or plaister it to the sore Eyes. If you infuse a good quantity of this Herb in a small Vessell full of Wine, and drinke no other daily, it will recover sight though long blinde.

Eyes to cleare, An approved distilled  
Water.

1 **T**Ake the juyces of Rue, Fennell, Celandine, and Eybright ana ij ℥, Honey i ℥ di. Aloes tutiæ, and Sarcocollæ ana iiii ℥, the Gall of a Capon or Cocke ii ℥, distill all these in a Limbecke or Glasse, drop this Water cold into the fore Eyes once a day three drops together, and use it till he be well.

2 Or take the waters of Roses, Vervine and Fennell ana iiii ℥, strong white Wine iiii ℥, Tutia prepared, and Sugarcandy ana three ℥, Aloes hepatick two ℥, powder fine all the simples that is to be powdred, mix them with the Waters and Wine, let it so stand covered one whol day, then strain the liquor easily in a faire Glasse, and use to drop three drops at once in the eye.

## CXXVI.

To cure all griefes in the Eyes.

**T**Ake three ℥ of unslak'd Lyme, infuse it in di. lb of raine Water in a Glasse vessell three dayes; then stirre and mix them well together, let them settle againe foure and  
twenty



twenty houres after; powre out the cleare water very cleane, then put thereto ten  $\frac{3}{4}$  of Salarmoniack the whitest you can get, very finely powdred, let it therein dissolve by long standing and oft shaking; then let it settle, and powre the clearest water off it, or filter it away by Distillation; drop three drops of this in the Eye at once, and so continue it three times every day till it be well: this cureth Spot, Pearle, Web, or any thing else in the Eye, be it Canker or Burning.

## CXXVII.

*Falling-sicknesse, the Cure.*

**M**ake two Plaisters as you doe of Masticke, of Sanguis Draconis, spread it with a hot knife, and lay them to the Temple veines.

## CXXVIII.

*Falling-sicknesse or Epilepsia, the Cure.*

**F**irst every Full and change of the Moone, Purge one day, and Vomit another, then kill a Jay, and dresse him, fill his body full of Cummin and Anniseeds bruised, then put the Jay so dressed in an Oven after Bread is drawne, untill he be so dry that you may  
beat

beat his body, sides and bones to powder, then take of this powder iʒ at a time in Broath, or any other way at pleasure morning and evening till he be well.

CXXIX.

*Feaver to prevent, or all other diseases  
by this cooling Cordiall.*

**T**Ake Lyquorice mundified iʒ, Carroway seed, and Cardimonium ana diʒ, Hyfop, and Carduus Benedictus ana di M. of Galingale ijʒ, bruise your drugs, and binde your hearbs in a bundle, boyle them all in a gallon of water close covered, till one pinte be consumed, then let it so stand till you strain it six houres, then let the Lyquorice and Cardimonium remain still in your strained drink; take thereof morning and evening at your pleasure, this worketh mervailously in preserving strength.

CXXX.

*Flux of blood to stop and Cure.*

**T**Ake the round mossie Bur that groweth on the Bryar that is the wilde Rose, dry it, and powder it, drink thereof in red or Claret wine morning and evening first and last.

CXXXI.

*Flux or Womens Menstrous to force  
or bring.*

**T**Ake Germander, Mugwort, Penny-  
ryall, Balme Hyrop, and Mallowes  
ana i M. Rew, Sage, Wormewood,  
Soothenwood, and Marjorum ana di M.  
Saffron i d. Castor i z thin sliced, Enula  
Campaine, and Cinnamon ana i z powdred,  
boyle all these in a pottle of water to the  
consumption of a quart, then strain it hard,  
and put thereto white Wine one pinte,  
drinke thereof first and last, morning and  
evening.

CXXXII.

*Bloudy Flux to stay, especially of  
Women.*

**M**Ake a payre of Beads of the Seahorse-  
tooth, and weare them on both your  
wrists, let no young women weare them  
but twenty four houres, for feare of fur-  
ther danger.

CXXXIII.

*Flux of Blood, or Gonoria Pills to stay it.*

**T**Aka Marmalet of Quinces two ℥, Coral Cinnamon, Amber, Shepherds purse, Alchenet, Acatia ana ii ℥ powdered and leashed; mix them together to a Masse for Pils, take foure of these Pils morning and evening first and last.

CXXXIIII.

*Fistula, the whole Cure.*

**F**irst purge the humour offending, then take the Soles of old Shooes dryed, burn them on a cleane hearth with Oaken wood to a bright coale, then lay it where it may consume to Ashes alone, then adde to the weight of the Ashes so much Greene Copperas fine powdered, as the Ashes of the Sole weigheth, and halfe so much weight of the powder of burned Allom as the Copperas weigheth, and halfe so much of the powder of golden Seacoale as of the burned Allom, then grinde all these together on a Painters Stone, or in a Morter to fine subtle powder, so put it close up till you use it either for Fistula or old Sore: when you are

to

to use it, take the Creame of the morning Milke of one Cow, set it by it selfe all night and one day, the next day cast away the greenish water in the bottome of that Creame, then lay a spoonfull of the Creame on a Trencher, then mix so much of the powder, therewith as will make the Creame blacke and thicke; then make your Tents of one inch long and no longer, if the Fistula be never so deepe, and role the Tents well in the Medicine, and Tent the Fistula therewith two times a day, and it will worke out in small pushes, wheales from the bottome, cover the Sore with a red Colewort leafe, when it is well digested, heale it up with Plaisters fit for it.

## CXXXV.

*A vulnary Potion for the Fistula.*

**B**Oyle in a quart of Spring-water Cloves Bruised, Pimpernell, Egrimony, red Colewort, Valerian, Mouseare, Doe-foot and wilde Tanzie ana i M. washed and chopped, boyled all in a Pipkin close covered till halfe be wasted, then put to it two spoonfuls of Honey, and one quart of white Wine, then let it boyle two walmes, and straine it hard forth, keepe it in a close  
Vyall,

Vyall, drink of it morning fasting at three in the after-noone, and last to bed; In Summer cold, and Winter hot, untill the Potion commeth out of the Orifice of the Fistula, which must be ever kept open with a Gentian tent.

CXXXVI.

*Fistula or Cankers, the Plaister to Cure.*

**T**Ake Letharge of gold j lb, oyl of Roses ij lb, white Wine Vinegar, and old Vrin ana di lb, boyle it till the Vrine and Vinegar be consumed, adde thereto in the boyling Wax ij ℥, Frankincense i ℥, mix it, and it cureth.

CXXXVII.

*Fistula, a Lotion to wash, or Sering that cureth.*

**T**Ake Bole-armoniack iiij ℥, Camphire i ℥, white Vitrioll iiij ℥ all powdered, boyl the Copperas and Camphire in a close stopped Pipkin till they be melted, still stirring them till they grow hard, then powder them and the Bolearmoniack together very fine, then put the powders up in a strong bladder, when you use it, take a pottle

pottle of running water, put it to the fire till it begin to boyl, then take it from the fire, and put therein three spoonfuls of the powder, as much as you can heap and presse on, put all in a double Vyall, shaking it twice every day for fourteen dayes before you use it, let it stand and settle very cleer, and apply it as hot as the Patient can suffer it: if it be for a Sore, wet a double cloath four times double, and apply it: if for a Fistula, use the Seringe, dresse it morning and evening till it be well. This cureth old Sores, Fistulaes, Pustuls, Cankers, Scabs in the Head or Body, green Wounds: if you will have it stronger, put unto it burnt Allom i $\bar{z}$  powdered.

## CXXV III.

*Fistula in the corner of the Eye, or elsewhere.*

**T**Ake Hempseed, Southernwood, Fennell, Parsley, Strawberry leaves and strings, Ribwort, Tanzie, Smallage, Garden madder, red Colewort leaves, ana i M. Nutmegs powdered i $\bar{z}$ ; boyl all these in three pints of water, then strain it, adde therto Honey four spoonfuls, therewith bathe the Fistula thrice a day, at every dressing let the Patient drink

of this potion foure spoonfuls warme; if the Fistula be deepe use a Seringe, and wet a red Coleleaf and lay thereon, you need not tent it; let the Patient sometime with his Potion drinke Triacle diateffaron i ℥, in a morning in his bed very hot, and sweat two houres after it. If humours flow much, purge once in ten dayes. Also keepe the Orifice open with Gentian tents that it close not; Also after that make Tents of Linnen, washed in Bucke and not in Sope, scrape lint of them, for tents wet them in fasting spittle, then let them dry, and dip them in the Creames and powder before set downe.

CXXXIX.

*Fistula or sore mouth, a Lotion.*

**T**Ake Guiacum iiii ℥, Plantine, small Cranes bill, Comfry, Knotgrasse, Shepherds purse, Woodbine, and Briar-leaves ana i M, boyle all these in three pintes of Smiths water till halfe be consumed, strain it in the liquor, and mix it well, keepe it to your use, if you will have it stronger, put thereto as much burn'd Allom as two Nutmegs, use it alwayes warme.



## CXL.

*Face heat, the Cure:*

1 **F**irst, purge with Pillule aggregative i ʒ, then take Camphire i ʒ, prepared Cinnamon ij ʒ, Brimstone, Ceruse, and Mastick ana ij ʒ all fine powdered, and wrought up with oyle of white Roses to a Cerote, anoynt your face with a bigge Pill made thereof as bigge as a Chesnut, ten nights together to bedward, in the morning wipe it hard with a dry linnen cloath, but wash it not all the ten dayes, then wash it foure morninge together with juyce of Lemmons and Butter-milke, the Lemmons slyced therein.

2 Also if you quilt bay Salt fine pwdred in a paire of linnen Socks, and weare it under your feet, it helpeth much. Abstaine from salt meats, Spices, meat brown roasted or fried, Wine, strong drink, Onions, Garlike, or Mustard, use in your Broaths Purslaine, Sorrell, and Violets, and all other coole hearbs.

3 Or take a quart of sweet Cream, small Ferne roots i M. cleansed and bruised very small, boyle them in the Cream till it come to a Salve, anoynt the face.

## C X L I.

*Face to cleanse, a Water that taketh away all Deformity.*

**T**Ake Pippins pared and coared, then sliced, Lemmons thin sliced, then take pure Manchet, and crum it fine, put it in new Milk, with all the other, and i ℥ of Camphire thin shred, then distill all these in balneo; use this Water as you need it.

## C X L I I.

*Face Moles to take away.*

**T**Ake the meal of Fengreeke, Honey and Water-creesses ana stamp, and incorporate them together, make a Plaister thereof, apply it to the Mole.

## C X L I I.

*Falling Sicknesse, the Cure.*

**T**Ake powder of the Mistletoe of the Oak, single Piony roots, the powder of mans scull dryed hard in the fire ana i ℥, Balm ii ℥, Sage flowers, Rosemary flowers, Marigold flowers ana ii ℥ flowers of the Line tree, Lillies of the Valley ana iii ℥, powder all these, and icesce them, take iv ℥ of this powder in the warm Julip following every morning fasting:

fasting: Take Cowslip water distilled i lb, syrup of Cowslip iv ℥ mixed together to the likenesse of a Jelly. Also take this syrup a day as occasion serveth, roots of Piony, Mistle of the Oak ana iv ℥, Cinamon vi ℥, Marigold flowers, Lilly of the Valley, and Lavander flowers ana M. red Rose leaves ii M. all grosse bruised, and put in a vessell with a narrow mouth, put thereto so much Aquavitæ as will cover them four fingers over, then stop it close, and pnt it in a balneo for four dayes, till it be red in colour, then strain it thorow an Hipograsse bag, then put to it Sugar-candy powdred di. lb, mix it well together, then put fire to it in the pot as you burn Sack, and so let it burn to a syrup, then put out the fire, so take it: if he have any grief in the Head, let him wear a Cap as followeth.

Take Marjorum, Bettony, Balm, Rosemary, Steechados ana di. M. red Rose leaves, the rinde of Citron ana issi ℥, Cloves, Mace Nutmegs, Cubbes, flowers of line tree ana iv ℥, all grosse powdred, and quilted with Cotton bombasse, covered with Taffaty or Holland, make it in form of a Cap, and wear it on your Head.

## CXLIII.

*Face heat by humours flowing.*

**T**Ake Sorrell, Succory, Dandelion, and Sowthistle ana i M. the buds of young Hops, Parsly roots ana vi, Fennell roots iij sliced and pithed, and boyled in three Gallons of Alewort, put Yest to it, and drink it at foure dayes old, drink no other drink while it lasteth.

## CXLV.

*Face very red pimpled, and Sans pblegme to Cure.*

**P**OWDER the liver of a Hare being well dryed, drink of that powder in your usuall drink, but better in an Allom Posset. Ale, so much as will lye on a nine pence first and last, morning and evening, *probatum est*, by a Gentlewoman much grieved with this Infirmary, and cured herewith.

## CXLVI.

*Flux to stop.*

1 **M**AKE an Allom Posset, boyled in milk, drinke of it first and last, it cures.

2 Or Make a Cake of Wheat flower, wit

with the juyce of Plantine and Comfry,  
with a little Alknet, bake it hard, sop it in  
good red Wine, with powder of Cinna-  
mon, eat the Sops, and drinke the Wine;  
it cureth.

CXLVII.

*Tents to make for Fistula's.*

1. **M**ix the powder of greene Coppe-  
ras, and Beane meale ana, confect  
them together with hard scraped French  
Sope in a Morter; Tent therewith, it will  
bring forth broken bones.

2 Or the powder of Euphorbium and  
Mastick ana mixed, boyle them in white  
Sope, when it cooleth make tents thereof,  
it consumeth all Moysture.

CXLVIII.

*Flesh to fret or eat away.*

**T**He powder of Euphorbium will fret a-  
way flesh layd thereto.

CXLIX.

*For Fractures or Bruises a Seare-  
cloath.*

**T**Ake Rozine and Wax ana  $\text{iiij } \zeta$ , Pero-  
sen  $\text{ij } \zeta$ , oyle  $\text{iiij } \zeta$ , melt them hot toge-  
ther,

ther, and adde thereto the fine searced powder of Cummin, mix them well together, then hot dip your Searcloath.

CL.

*A strong Powder for Fistula or old Sores,  
apply it with Tents or  
otherwise.*

**T**Ake Auripigmentum, Virdigrease, gals, Salt Gem, salt Armoniack, Harts-horne burn'd and powdred, the boanes of a Hare burn'd, Mans dung burn'd, Egshels, Oyster-shells, Muscleshels, all burn'd Sanguis draconis, Tartar, Letharge of gold, the shells of a water Crab burn'd, unslaked Lyme, Pepper white and black, Ginger, Frankincense, Glasse Mastik, and an old Shooe all burn'd, and fine powder ana, then adde thereto the powder of burnt Allom, as much as of all the rest in weight, mix all well together, and apply it as before.

CLI.

*Fire-wilde, or St. Anthonies fire.*

**T**Ake the Lees of Claret or white Wine, and the dreggs of Vinegar, the whites and yolks of Eggs well brayed and mixed together, and lay it to the grieve.

## CLII.

*Fistula's or foule Vlcers a Lotion.*

**B**Oyle one quart of Spring water, Rosemary, Sage, Dazies, Dovefoot, wilde Tanzie, Egrimony, and Plantaine ana i M, bruised Allom as much as a Walnut, white wine Vinegar ten spoonefulls, English hony four spoonefulls, then strain it hard, and put to the liquor so much powder of burn'd Vitrioll as will colour it like bloud, use this with Seringe or Lotion.

## CLIII.

*For the Fistula, a Potion used by the Ancients.*

**T**Ake Barly mundified, and the leaves of Celendine ana i ℥, Centory, Egrimony, and Plantine ana ij ℥, Aristolochia longa ℥ iiii ℥, the leaves of Olive, and Dropwort ana ij ℥, cut them all, then pound them, and boyle them in white Wine with Sugar, drink a draught of this Decoction every morning fasting one houre after.

*Falling-sickenesse, the Cure.*

**T**Ake the Blood, Livers and Hearts of Moales dryed and powdred, give iʒ of this Powder in Piony-water in the morning, fast two houres after, use it six mornings.

## CLV.

*Fistula, a Tent.*

**M**ix the powder of Hermodactils with French Sope, make a Tent.

## CLVI.

*Flesh dead, to fret away.*

**L**ay the powder of Hermodactils on the Sore, it will cleanse it.

## CLVII.

*The best Potion in the world to Cure the Fistula.*

**T**Ake twelve Cloves bruised, Pimpernell, Egrimony, Valerian, red Colewort, Mouscare, wilde Tanzie, Dovefoot, Strawberries, Plantine, red Madder, and sharp Docke ana i M, bruise all these in a stone Morter, boyle them in two quarts of Spring water sufficiently, then itraine it hard



hard out, put the liquor to the fire againe,  
adde thereto one quart of white Wine, ho-  
ney vi 3, let the Patient drink thereof mor-  
ning and evening first and last for fourteene  
dayes; this drink is of an incredible effica-  
cie, for it cleareth all corruption from the  
Fistula in thirteene dayes, and broaken bones.  
If the Patient vomit up this Potion three  
dayes together at the first taking hereof, his  
Cure is to be doubted, if he vomit not, no  
doubt of his health, in drinking thereof, put  
Ginger thereto to allay the winde of the  
hearbs.

CLVIII.

*For a Trusb in a sucking Childs mouth,  
or any sore.*

**M**ake a hole in the Crowne of a new  
laid Egge and take out all the meat,  
fill the shell with Honey and burn'd Allom  
mixed, let it boyle on the fire, still stirring it  
with a Bodkin, then take it out, and dresse  
the Sore.

CLIX.

*Foale festred Sores and Cankers.*

**T**ake Ink, Auripigmentum, quick Brim-  
stone, Salt Gemana, dissolve them all  
in

in Vinegar, and put them in an unglassed Pipkin, and close it well that the fume goe not forth, and burne it therein till all come to ashes, then powder it, and wash the powder in Vinegar, or infuse it in Vinegar that is warme, and put thereof presently on the Sore, as soone as it is quenched in the Vinegar; then lay this oyntment following thereon, *viz.* red Lead, the fat of a Goat, filings of Copper, mix them, and make an Vnguent thereof.

CLX.

*For fretting Sores, a Cure.*

**T**Ake oyle of Radish roots and Salt, bray them together, and Plaister them on.

CLXI.

*Flesh superfluous in Wounds, or proud flesh.*

**L**Ay on the flesh the powder of *Assa fœtida*, it taketh it away; the ashes of burnt Wooll doth the same. Also the powder of wilde Calamint or Scordium will consume the proud flesh, and kill the Wormes.

## CLXII.

*Gowt, a Medicine.*

**T**AKE Mutton-sewet untryed iiii lb, the Kidnies i lb di lb, greene Bay-leaves, Wormewood, and Rew ana i lb, red Sage and Mercury ana i M; let the Hearbs be all greene gathered in the midst of May, and beat in a stone Morter by little at once, as you may well, be at them small like Green-sawce, then boyle them in a close Pipkin halfe an houre softly; adde thereto Sallet-oyle one quart; let it boyle one walme, when it is neere cold straine it hard, and put it in Gally-pots; and with this anoynt the Gowt cold, without heating it, then lay on this Searcloth following, *viz.* Perofine di lb, virgin Wax ii ℥, melt them on the fire in a Pipkin, adde thereto oyle of Roses and red Rose leaves powdred ana ii ℥, boyle them all one walme; make your Searcloath, lay it on the Griefe three dayes without removing.

## CLXIII.

*Gowt, a speciall Medicine.*

**T**AKE so many Raisins of the Sunne stoned as will make a Plaister for the Griefe, pound them like Morter, then plai-  
ster

ster there; if the Griefe be extreame, mix some Opium therewith, it will ease the paine.

2 *Item*, anoynt the Griefe with oyle of Wax, it easeth much.

3 *Item*, the Gall of an Ox and Aquavitæ ana, as much oyle of Exeter as all the other mixed together, and anoynt the place therewith warme, and wet a double cloath therein, and apply it thereto.

CLXIII.

*Gonorrhœa, a Pill that cureth.*

**T**Ake Bolearmoniack, Turpentine washed in Plantine water, Masticke, Borax, dried Eggeshels ana ii ℥, Anniseeds, Dragons blood, red Corral ana ii ℥, all pulverised and searced, then compound them to a Masse for Pills, give thereof morning and evening first and last two Pills, drink oft red Wine or Alegant.

CLXV.

*Gonorrhœa, or Womens Whights.*

**T**Ake the powders of Sanguis draconis, Corral, Cresses seeds, Alchenet, Acorn cups, Terra sigillata, and Venice Turpentine, all powdered ana iii ℥, confect them up  
with

with Treacle and Conserve of red Roses to a consistance; take thereof first and last morning and evening one or two drams till you be well.

CLXVI.

*Gonorrhœa, a Julip to strengthen the Backe.*

**T**Ake Capdates twelve, small Nuts five pints, stampe the kernels by themselves, and the shels by themselves, take Brocklime, Nepe, Clary, Dazies, Dandelion, and Plantine ana i M. the pith of an Oxe backe, the pizle and stones of a young Ram, slit them and make them cleane, and boyle them in five quarts of Alegant to the consumption of halfe; make it fit for your taste with Sugar, straine it and drinke thereof first and last.

CLXVII.

*Gonorrhœa, Pills to cure it.*

**T**Ake Pearle and Comfrey roots dryed and powdred Coral, Amber ana iiii ℥, Bolearmoniack, barke of Guiacum, Terra sigillata, terra Lemnia ana iii ℥, make them up to a Masse for Pils with Venice Turpentine washed in Plantine water; take of  
this

this seaven Pills, as small as Cherry-stones first and last morning and evening, fast three houres after in the morning.

## CLXVIII.

*Greene-sickenesse, the Cure.*

1 **T**Ake clarified Honey one pinte, Rew, red Sage ana i M, stampe them, and straine out the iuyces, mix them with the Honey, stirre them all together, then boyle them one walme, put to them a little powder of Pepper; drinke every morning hereof one spoonfull di. warme, and fast two houres after, and last at night the like. In the day eat Raisins of the Sunne, and use some exercise during the Cure; eat twice every day Pottage made of Water-Cresss and Brocklime.

2 Sometime use this Almond milke, take Succory, Egrimony, Cardus, French Wormwood, and yellow Dock-roots ana, boyle them in faire Water, then blanch bitter Almonds, take their milke and mix all together; this Decoction drunke in the morning fasting cureth.

3 *Item*, six bitter Almonds eaten in a morning for one weeke, and fast one houre after, is good,

4 *Item*,

Item, your Ale must be reasonable in the Wort, whereof must be boyled Egrimony, garden Wormwood, Costmary, Succory, and yellow Dock roots.

CLXIX.

*Greene sicknesse, or any other grieffe, an Ale to drink in the Spring.*

**T**Ake Zenne vi ℥, Wormwood and Balme ana ij M, Anniseed and Fennell seed ana ℥ iij ℥, the juyce of Scurvygrasse iij pints, water-Cresses, and Broke lime ana i pinte, let these be bruised and put in a thinne linnen bagge, with a stone to sink it into foure Gallons of new Ale out of the Tun, so let it all work till it be foure dayes old, then drink thereof in the morning fasting di. pinte, if it purge not three or foure Stooles a day, then drink as much at night; use it till you be well.

CLXX.

*Gorrhæa, all Fluxes of Bloud whatsoever, and Womans Whights.*

**T**Ake of the foure cold seeds husked, the seeds of white Poppy, of Mallowes, Quinces, Purslyne and Martiles, Pine kernels, Gum Arabick, Gum Dragant, white  
G Sugarcandy

Sugarcandy, Lycorice mundified, Penides, French Barly, Psilium, sweet Almonds ana  $\text{iiij} \text{ʒ}$ , fine Bole, red Roses, Sanguis Draconis, Spodij, Mirrhe ana  $\text{i} \text{ʒ}$ , mix all these being fine searced with so much Hydromell as will make it a Masse for Trochis, make them all of the waight of  $\text{di} \text{ʒ}$  a peece; when you use any of these, dissolve one of them in six spoonfuls of very hot milke, if they grow so hard that they will not dissolve, then grate or beat them in fine powder, and put them in the milk; drink or eat this Dosse first and last, it cures in five or six dayes: often proved, the body being before duly prepared.

## CLXXI.

*Glysters to loose and fasten.*

**B**Oyle a Sheeps head with the leaves of Hollyhocks, Mallowes, and Mercury ana  $\text{i} \text{M}$ , the seeds of Fennel and Parsly bruised, the roots of both pitched, Linseed, all the seeds powdred, put in some Butter or oyle, then straine out  $\text{x} \text{ʒ}$  thereof, mix therewith Diaphenicon  $\text{ij} \text{ʒ}$ , or of Diacotholicon  $\text{ij} \text{ʒ}$  as the disease requireth, minister it no warmer then you may abide the bladder on your cheek.

**T**Ake Malmsey one pinte, boyle therein the seeds of Parsly and Fennell bruised ana iij ℥, mother of Tyme, Penryyal, let them boyle a good while, then put thereto Ginger, Cummin, and Enula Campaine all bruised ana i ℥, Sugar, Oyle quod sufficit for a Glister.

## CLXXIII.

*Gowt paine to ease putckly on warrentize.*

**T**amp red Archangell in a Morter with Vinegar, and binde it to the place grieved, it will presently ease, if it doe not, mix little Opium therewith, it failes not.

## CLXXIII.

*A Gargarizme to wash and cleanse a sore mouth.*

**T**Ake Plantin burn'd, Strawbury leaves and Knotgrasse ana i M. Sorrell, and Sage ana i M. red Rose leaves i M. di. ix therewith long Pepper, Pellitory of pain ana i ℥ ij, boyl them in a pottl of water to the consumption of half, then strain it,

put thereto honey of Roses i ℥ di. and Oxymell Squilliticum ; so it is made.

CLXXV.

*Another good one.*

**T**Ake Hyera picra simplex iiii ℥ , Opimell Sillitticum ii ℥ , the distilled waters of Hyssope, Bettony, and Organy i ℥ di. mix them, and make your Gargarizme, minister it warme to draw humours ; but when you will stop them, use cold things in your mouth as Vinegar or Fountaine water.

CLXXVI.

*Head ache of Rheume, the Cure.*

**T**Ake one Nutmeg, Cubebs ; Piony seed, Setwell roots, Marjorum, Anglica roots ana ii ℥ , dry all these, and powder them fine, and make them up with Honey to a Masse for Pills, whereof take every morning five small ones.

*Item,* Fry fresh English Hops in Muscadine, and bind them as a Poultis very warme to the Nape of the Neck, renew it as occasion serveth ; this helpeth.

*Item,* Oyle of Cloves to anoynt the temple, is very good.

*Item,*

Item, Two plaisters of Flos unguentorum laid to the temples like Mastick plaisters, and on the Nape of the neck, helpeth.

## CLXXVII.

Head beating or noyse, to purge away  
by the nose.

**P**Ut the juyce of Beets, Bettony, Dazie roots, ground Jvy, or any of them put in a Sawcer, and with a quill snuffed in the Nostrill, let your mouth be full of warme water, every time you doe it, then drop two drops of oyle of Amber into your eares, be eating some Crust in your mouth when you doe it, it will enter the better.

## CLXXVIII.

Head ache, the Cure.

**T**Ake oyle of Roses, and oyle of Camomile ana ii ℥, wax ii ℥, Rose Vinegar six drops, dissolve them on the fire, when it is cold anoynt the temples therewith.

Item, if the paine be hot, adde thereto oyle of Violets, white Poppy, unguentum Popilium ana ii ℥, and ii<sup>d</sup>. of Camphire mixed.

## CLXXIX.

*Head, a Gargarizme.*

**T**Ake Bettony i M. Vinegar i pint, a little Cinnamon, as much Stavesacre, both bruised, boyle them together to the consumption of halfe, Gargarize with one spoonfull thereof, but if the paine come from the stomack, boyl the afore-said simple in good Gascon Wine, and drinke it with Cinnamon.

Or take Frankincense, Pidgeons dung, Wheat flower ana i ʒ, temper them with the white of an Egge; and binde it to the aking place.

## CLXXX.

*Humors from any place being settled.*

**T**Ake Bullocks Lights, and parboyle them, and then very hot slit them, and lay them to the place grieved, it will draw it away.

## CLXXXI.

*Haire to bring againe.*

**T**Ake Bulls Tallow, Honey, and oyle of Tartar ana i ʒ, boyle them together, anoynt the bald place therwith.

## CLXXXII.

*Haire to cause to fall or take away.*

**T**Ake bloud suckers burn'd to Ashes, mix the ashes with strong Vinegar, wash any hairy place therewith, it wil fall away,

Or the bloud of a Bat suffereth no haire to grow.

## CLXXXIII.

*For all diseases in head, as Megrom, Impostume, Dropsie, Feavers, Headache, and corrupt stomack.*

**T**Ake the roots of Pellitory of Spaine Spiknard ana iiij ℥ powdred, Vinegar and Mustard mixed with the powders well together, keep it in a close Gally pot, hold half a spoonfull thereof in the mouth a good while, and spit from him the rhowme in a Bason as often as he needeth, or for six dayes, then take this powder for foure dayes.

Take Galingale i ℥, Nutmeg iiij ℥, Cloves and Cinnamon ana ij ℥ Lycorice iiij ℥, Sugar ij ℥ all powdred, take thereof first and last in good lyquor, the Dosse it halfe a spoonfull.

## CLXXXIII.

*Hearing lost, to renew againe.*

**T**Ake the Brine of Beefe, the elder the better, boyle it well, scum it cleane often, keepe it in a Glasse, take the clearest thereof, and wrap it warme to the eares deafe.

## CLXXXV.

*Heat in the Body or Liver, a Julip.*

**T**Ake pure French Barly ii M, boyle it in a pottle of water, put therein Raisins of the Sun, and Prunes ana i ℥, Fennell and Parsly roots cleaned and pithed ana i ℥, Endive, Harts tongue, Liverwort, Sowthistle, Crops of Wormwood, Mercury, Mallowes ana iiii ℥, boyle them well together in a close Pipkine, then straine it out hard, put the liquor to the fire again, and put to it red Saunders powdered i ℥, Sugar to sweeten it to a Julip what suffizeth, adde to it Musk three graines, use the drink thereof warme.

*Item,* if you will have more cooling, adde thereto Violets, Lettice, Sorrell, Borage, and Clivers the like quantity.

## CLXXXVI.

*Dianthos, which helpeth all feeblenesse of the Body, the Tifficke, the grieffe of the Heart and Liver, after long Sicknesse.*

**T**Ake Cloves, Galingale, Ginger, Spicke, Nutmegs ana ii ℥ di. Carraway, Annis, Cardamonium ana ii ℥, Liquorice, red Roses, Violets, and Rosemary flowers ana iiii ℥, Honey clenfed, and Rosewater sufficient. Let them be all fine searced, then mixe it with the Honey and Rosewater, or simpred on the fire to a confection, the Dosse is iiii ℥.

## CLXXXVII.

*Head Megrome or paine, the Cure on warrandize.*

**T**Ake gray Sope iiii ℥, bray therein the whites of two Egges, and put it in a Box; when you use it, spread it on a double cloath, and lay it to the forehead even to the Eares, and dresse it twice a day for five dayes together, you shall finde ease at the first two dressings,

## CLXXXVIII.

*To cure any heat or Feavour, a Julip.*

**T**Ake Rosewater, or Violet water one  
pinte, Sugar di. lb, boyle them toge-  
ther by a soft fire, clarifie it with the  
white of an Egge, colour it with red Sanders  
so straine it and use it.

## CLXXXIX.

*Humours to stay that floweth out, and will  
not be stayed.*

**T**Ake the waters of Endive, Sorrell, Let-  
tice and Vinegar, one pinte of each, boyle  
them together by a soft fire with sufficient  
Sugar, drinke thereof often.

## CLXXXIX.

*Hemrods, a Plaister to cure them.*

**T**Ake Lovage, and Rew powdred small  
mixed with Honey, make a Plaister and  
apply it.

## CLXXXI.

*Head paines very old to cure.*

**T**Ake Gum Arabick, Myrrhe, Saffron, and  
Euphorbium ana iii ℥, bray them toge-  
ther



ther with the white of an Egge well beaten, then applyed Plaister wise on the temples and forehead; this presently cures.

CLXXXII.

*Hurts in the Scull.*

**T**Ake the juyce of Pimpernell, and wet therein peeces of Linnen cloath, and apply it oftentimes thereto, it will heale it quickly.

CLXXXIII.

*Head Megrome, paine or winde.*

**P**Ut a lump of the best Mithridate in your mouth, as big as a good Hazell-nut, there let it melt without champing, holding your breath as much as you can; as it melts receive it into your stomacke; this will ventose at the eares, and presently ease the Head.

CLXXXIII.

*Faundies yellow, a sure and quicke Cure.*

**T**Ake Plantine water one pinte, Ivory powdren ii 3, Saffron so much as will make it yellow, boyle them all two walmes, then straine: drink a pretty draught therof warme first and last.

2 Or take the ashes of a Vine burned, lay them thicke on a boord foure square, divide them in nine equall parts, by making with a Knife three cuts one way, and three cuts another, then with the finger make a deepe print in every one of them, then fill every hole, or print with the Patients owne water, let it so stand nine dayes, adding thereto upon the Vrine in every hole three shives of Saffron undryed; if you make nine Cakes of the nine heaps with the Patients water, and bake them, and then lay the Saffron as aforesaid on every one of them for nine days it cureth.

**T**ake English Honey, melt it in a dish, then shred off the inner bark of a white Bullas tree, Pepper, and white Ginger, as much as will make two little Pills, so bigge as a black Cherry, wrap each of them in a thin linnen cloath, dip them in a dish of hot Honey, hold them in your mouth one after another, when one cooleth take another, doe this till the paine be gone.

*Ptyfick, or any disease of the Lungs.*

**T**Ake the roots of Parsly, Fennell, and Succory ana i M pithed, the fresh tops of Rosemary and Bettony ana i M. Anniseed bruised, Liquorice mundified and thin sliced ana i ℥ di. ℥, Enula Campaine roots powdered iv ℥, Raisins of the Sunne stoned iv ℥, English Saffron ℥ i, boyle all these in three quarts of running water one houre, then straine out the liquor, and put it to fire againe, with three spoonfulls of Honey, when it boyles scum it, let it coole, and bottle it up for your use, drink morning and evening eight spoonfulls thereof warme, sometimes tost a Fige, and eat it dipt in the powder of Bettony.

St. **P**eters Wort i ℥, fine powdred, a decoction of honied Wine purgeth the belly.

Polypody of the Oake in decoction, purgeth phlegme gently, the Dosse is i ℥.

Pruins damask di. ℥, boyled with honey one spoonful, & Senna i ℥, make an Electuary thereof,

thereof purgeth gently, it may be sharpened with any the precedent Medicaments.

Palma Christi both hearb and seed boyled in decoction purgeth phlegme and waterish humours upward and downward

Peniryall with Honey purgeth the Lungs and Breast, and with one  $\zeta$  of Alces purgeth and helpeth the Crampe and Convulsion of Sinews.

Peach flowers or blossomes infused in warme water xxiv houres, then strained out and new put in as before, and used and renewed vi. times, then strained, and the liquor boyled up with Sugar to a Syrup, take two spoonful, thereof at once, it is the gentlest purgation in the World, none better nor easier.

**R**ubarb two  $\zeta$  more or lesse to the parties strength infused or otherwayes purges Choler.

**S**outhernwood seed one  $\zeta$  powdered and boyled in white Wine, purgeth phlegme by Urine.

Scammony ten or xii graines roasted in a Quince, and the Scammony cast away, then eat the Quince or make an Electuary with Pruins and some viii grains thereof, purgeth Choler and fl my phlegme.

Scabius the Decoction purgeth Scabs and Sores of the Bladder by Urine.

Seny ii ℥, Mechoacan iv ℥, white Ginger one ℥, Anniseed and Licorice, ana ii ℥, Saltgem, iii ℥, all fine powdered and searced, take it fasting one for two spoonfuls in warme white Wine, it is a gentle purgation.

Sowbread root one ℥ di. with honied water, purgeth grosse phlegme and filthy humours.

Stecadoc, or French Lavander, opens all stoppings in body, and expels all corrupt humours, it is an excellent hearb for Man.

**T**Utsare seed iii ℥, small powdered in decoction, purgeth Choler and is good for Diopsie, drinke water two dayes after it.

Turnefole one M. boyled in white Wine, purgeth Choler and phlegme.

Turbith one ℥ di. in an Electuary with Syrup of Violets and Ginger, purges phlegme.

Tinthimill seed or Spurge corrected, discretly purges both wayes.

Three-leafed-grasse, the Decoction with Honey and Salt for a Glyster purgeth the guts of slime and filth.

**V**iolets the syrup iii ℥, purgeth gently, you may sharpen it with any the precedents.

**W**Oad one pennyworth of the seed boyled with Water and Honey, purgeth choler.

Wormwood purgeth by Siege and Urine a weake stomack, troubled with choler and phlegme.

**T**He powder of the root of stinking Gladwine snuffed or taken with a Pipe.

The powder or fume of Tobacco taken as aforesaid.

The root of Lacerwort chewed in the mouth, purgeth and easeth the Tooth-ache.

The root of Primrole stamped and strained, snuffe the juyce, purges and helps the Meagrom.

The root of Masterwort chewed.

The powder of the root of wilde Hellyboare.

Urine thin if it shew black above betokens great losse of Nature.

Urine thick and troubled horspisse signifieth head-ache.

Urine fat in the bottome, white in the middest, and red above, shews the Fever quartan.

Urine fat like flesh with dregs in the bottome like shadowing, shews the Dropfie of Cold, but if it be whey above, cleere in

*A judgement of the state of Mans sicknesse  
by the Pulse.*

**L**ay your four fingers on the Pulse, then marke which finger the Pulse is most strongly under; if the Pulse under the little be feeble and weake, and so under every finger to the heart upward be more weake, it signifieth death.

Contrariwise, if under the little finger it smite strong, and under the Ring-finger stronger, the middle finger more strong, and under the forefinger next the heart strongest of all, it is a good signe and prognosticateth health.

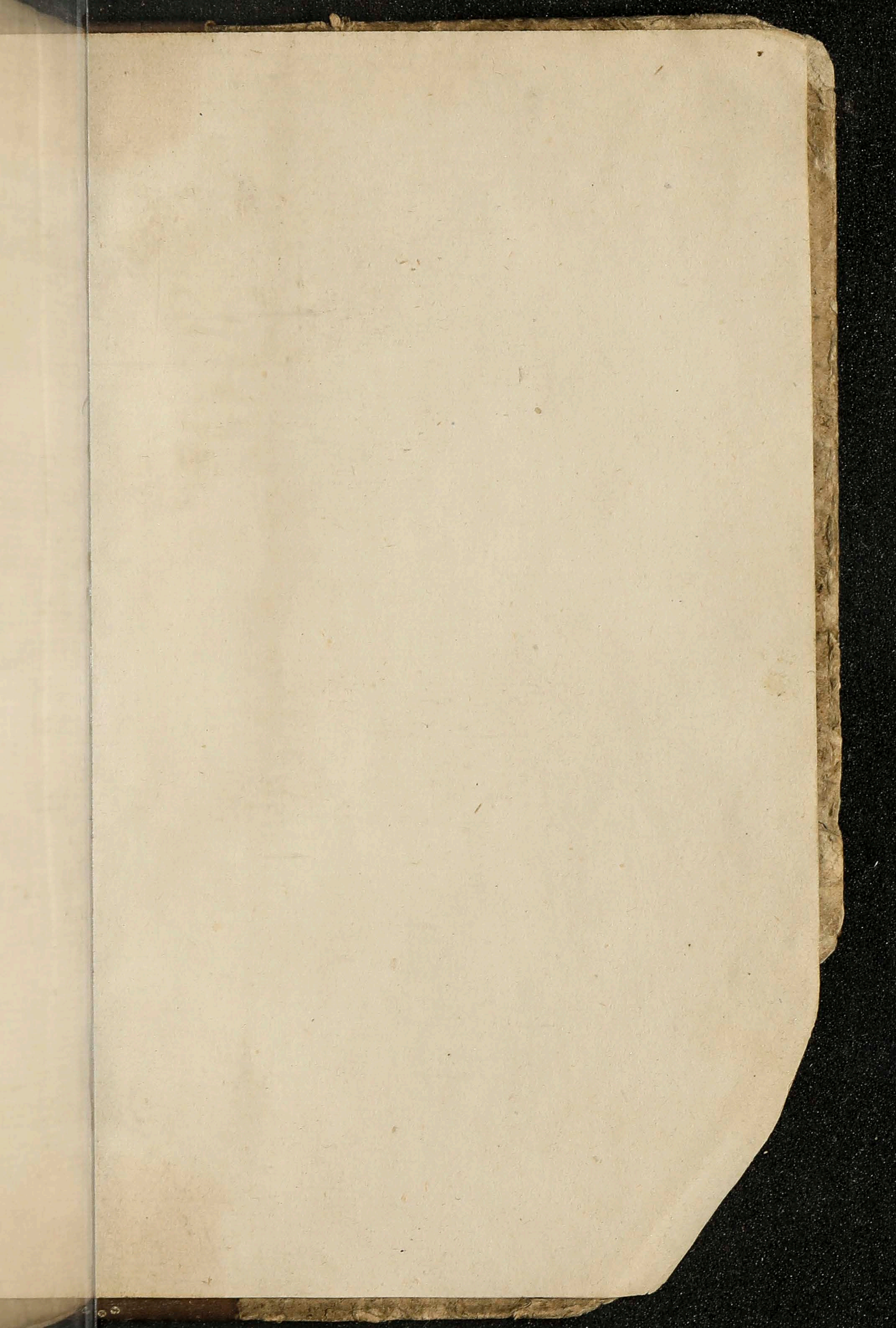

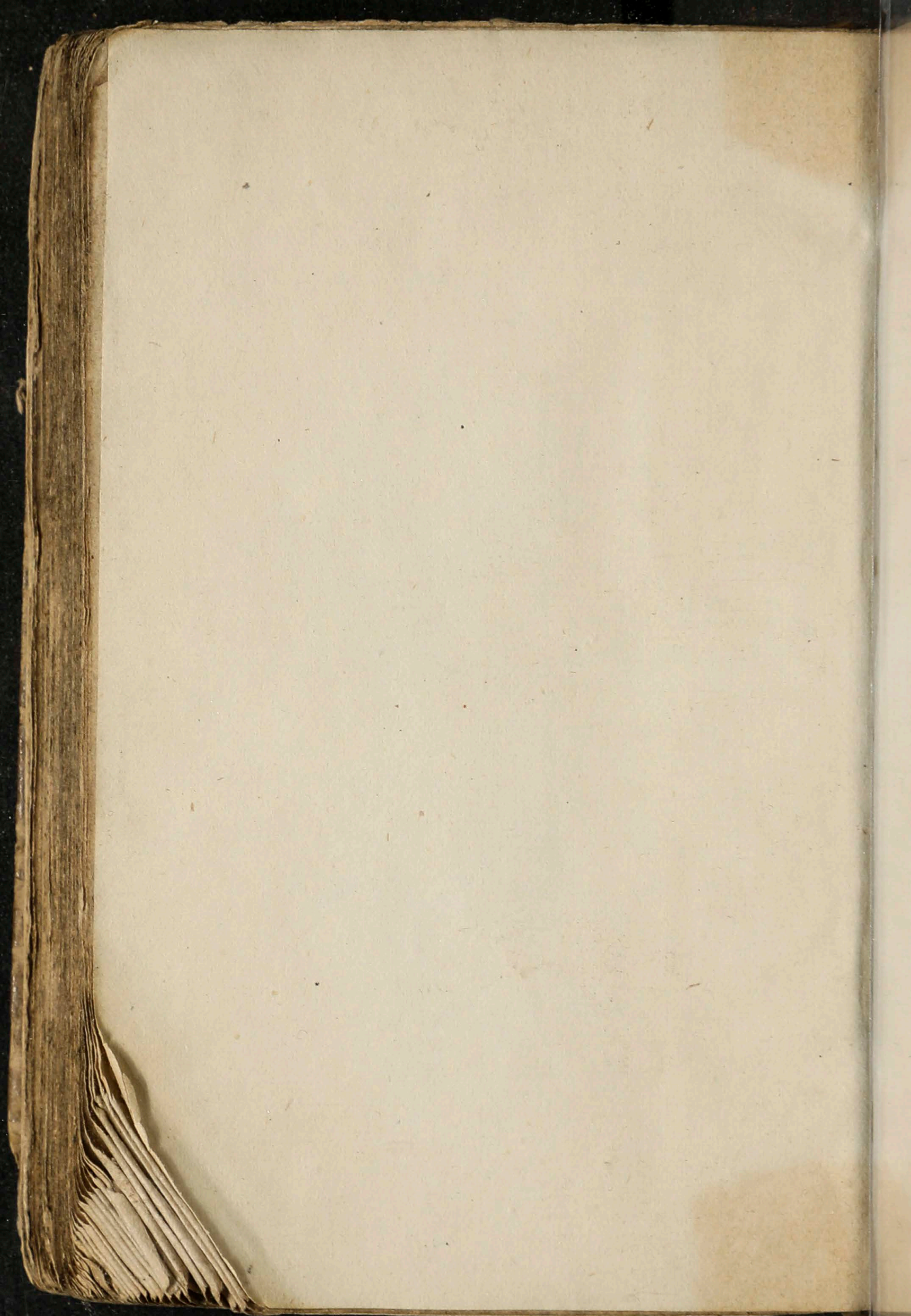

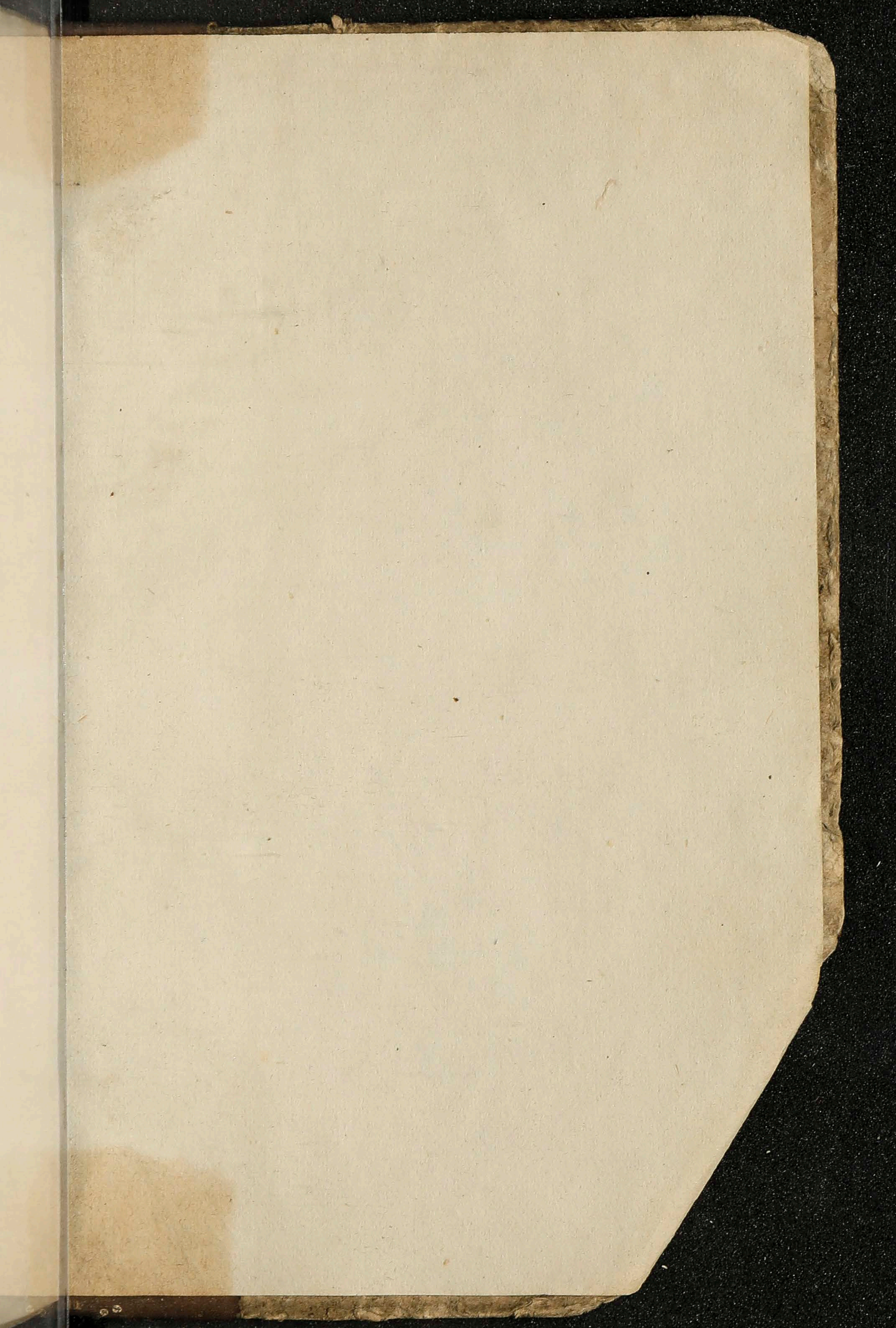
