

At a General Council held at Saugering
August 29th 1853, the following persons were present.

Chief Alexander Madwayosh {
John Katalhegum } Chief at Saugering
John Ames Haubudick { Chiefs at Newash
Peter Jones He-gidoree }

and the principal Indians from these several Bands.

The Rev C. Landauer (who was present, at the
special request, of the Chief,) was requested to act as
Secretary - and Moses Madwayosh was requested to
act as assistant Secretary.

A deputation from the Iroquois Indian
Band, recently settled near Colpoy Bay, consisting of
Ignace Jules, Ignace Tah-dah-ka, and four others
presented to the Council a request for a additional
grant of land, for the extension of their settlement
at that place. And also stated that about three
hundred families - including fifteen hundred persons
wish to integrate from Cah-Hau-noo-coah-ga, and
settle near Colpoy Bay, if land can be procured for
that purpose.

In reply - Chief Alexander Madwayosh, stated
that, as several Chief of other Bands having previously ~~stated~~
made application to them for land, on which to settle, it
is therefore not practicable - at the present time, to grant
their request. And also in the absence of the Chiefs

of other neighbouring Bands, this Council do not
wish to take any final action in the case.

After further conversation on the subject
a vote was taken, and Chief Alexander Madawajah's
position in this case was sustained by a unani-
mous vote of the Chiefs other Members of the
Council present.

Also it was resolved that Chiefs John
J. Paulineck, Peter J. Kegidooonee, and John Smith
be directed to determine and fix the boundary of
the land, already granted to the Iroquois Band.

The propriety of opening a road, from
the land now occupied by the Iroquois Band
to the head of St. Croix River, was introduced, by
Frederick J. Pagues, and after some conversation on
the subject it was referred to the Newash Band
it being a matter, ^{whether} in they are more particularly
concerned.

A letter bearing date 18th Augt 1853 from
the Rice Lake Band, written by M. C. Paulish
was read - proposing to emigrate to this part of the
country, and asking for land suitable for them
to settle upon.

In reply, Chief Alexander Madawajah stated
with great pleasure, he would comply with
their wish, and that their request having been made
a long time previous to the application made by the
Iroquois Band was by the cause of his not being
willing to grant them their request for more land.

and that he felt highly pleased, to know that
the Rice Lake Band, wish to settle among us.

The other chiefs and principal Indians
present, also expressed their delight in the prospect
of the Rice Lake immigrating, to our part of the Country,
and expressed their willingness to freely comply with
their request, in granting them land to settle upon.

A letter from the Red Peter Jines on behalf of the
Credit Bands was also read requesting, that land may
be promised kept for the future settlement of their
children. It was Resolved that, if the Credit Band
wishes to settle among us now, we will be happy to give
them land for that purpose, but we do not think it
safe practicable, to pledge ourselves, to furnish to
their children with farms here after.

A letter dated 18th Inst. from Reed Thomas
Hullibird, addressed to Chief Alexander Madwaypest,
was read - advising that drill privileges, fisheries,
etc, &c. be kept in view of the ~~Rice Lake~~ Rice Lake
Band, and other Bands settling among us.

It was resolved, that whereas at a former
Council held at Stewash, our Great Father the Gov-
ernor General, was requested through Captain
Anderson, to lease - for our advantages the Mill Cite
with a certain portion of our land at the mouth
of the River Stewash. But in consequence of the
several Bands of Indians, from other parts of the
Country having applied for lands to settle upon us
among us; And considering the strong probability

of our Settlement being soon increased, and by
this means - having a increase of funds available.
Resolved therefore, that we will respectfully
request our Great Father the Governor General to
with hold leasing our Mill site at the Sauble, in
view of our soon erecting of Mills in that place
for our own use. And that the Revd C. Vandeven
be requested to communicate to the Government
our wishes on this subject -

August 30th 1853. At a subsequent Meeting
of Chief A. Madwayosk. J. Kadukogun. Isidore
Mawanoosk. Papamosh. Revd Peter Jacobs and others
in Council, the subject respecting the Mill privilege
was reconsidered. When it was Resolved that we
will request the Government to lease the Site to, at
the Sauble to Mr McVatt of Southampton on the
conditions - that he will give it up to them at any
time at a fair valuation for all the improvements
he may make -
