

Wentford 18<sup>th</sup> March 1833

Sir

I beg you will be kind enough to impress upon the mind of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor the propriety of my being instructed to perform the surveys for the Six Nations agreed upon at their last Councils. I am ready at any time to commence the work, but do not feel safe in going on with it as His Excellency told me that I must not do any thing till I was officially instructed. The season is far advancing - and several of the Chiefs have been with me, urging me to perform my contract with them - They are particular want the drowned lands surveyed immediately. I am only waiting for instructions - Perhaps I might commence that work, and instructions for the survey of the lands could be sent at a future date, if they cannot now be made out.

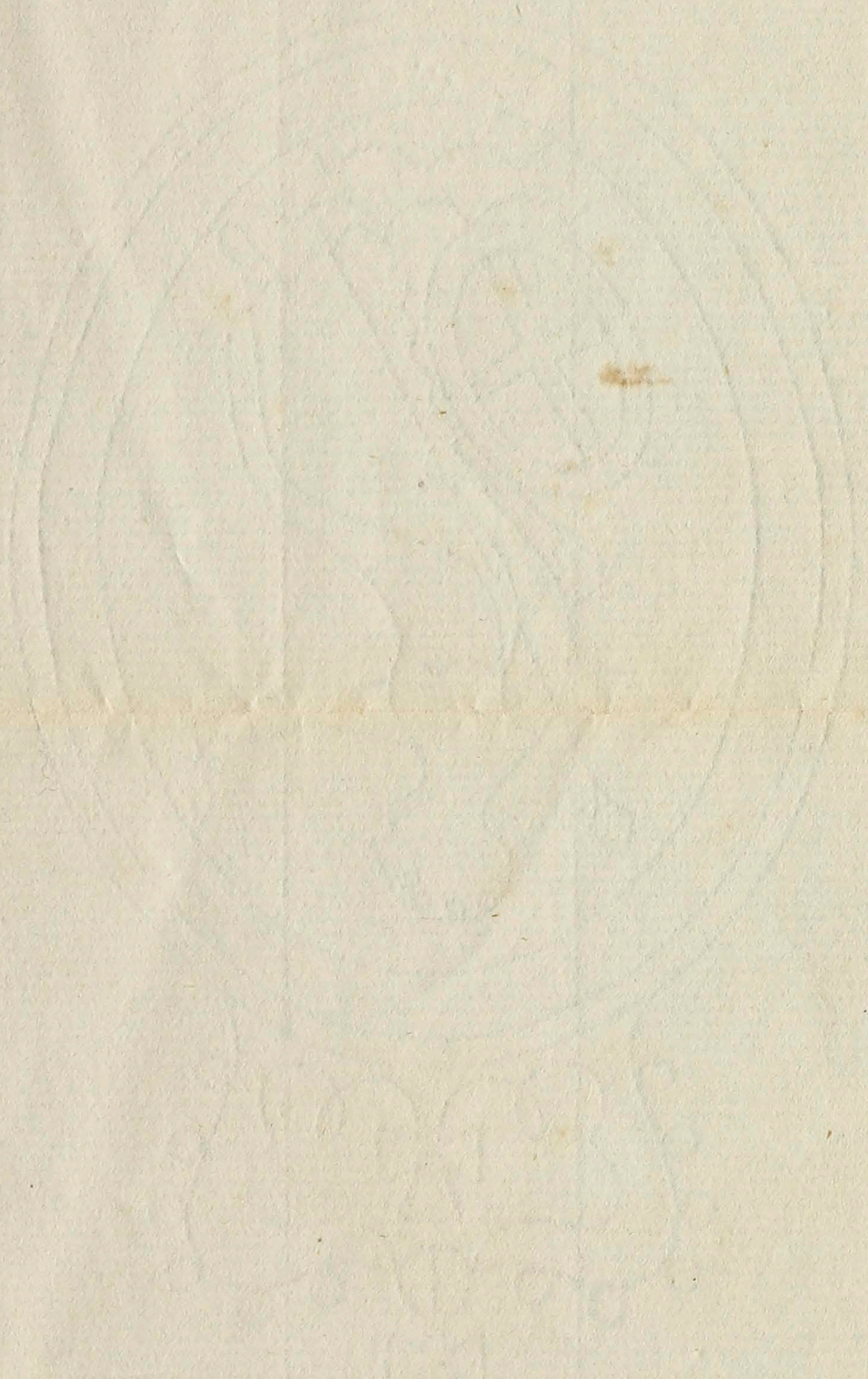
