Sir

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 15th instant, communicating to me the desire of the Six Nations Indians to send another Deputation to wait upon His Excellency the Governor General at Kingston for the purpose of making known to His Excellency the state of their affairs, particularly with reference to their Land, and the investment of their funds in the Grand River Navigation ^{improvements}, without their Consent, -

As these subjects, have repeatedly been brought under the consideration of the several Governors who have administered the Government of the Province for the last ten years, and as they were again brought under the notice of His Excellency the Governor General

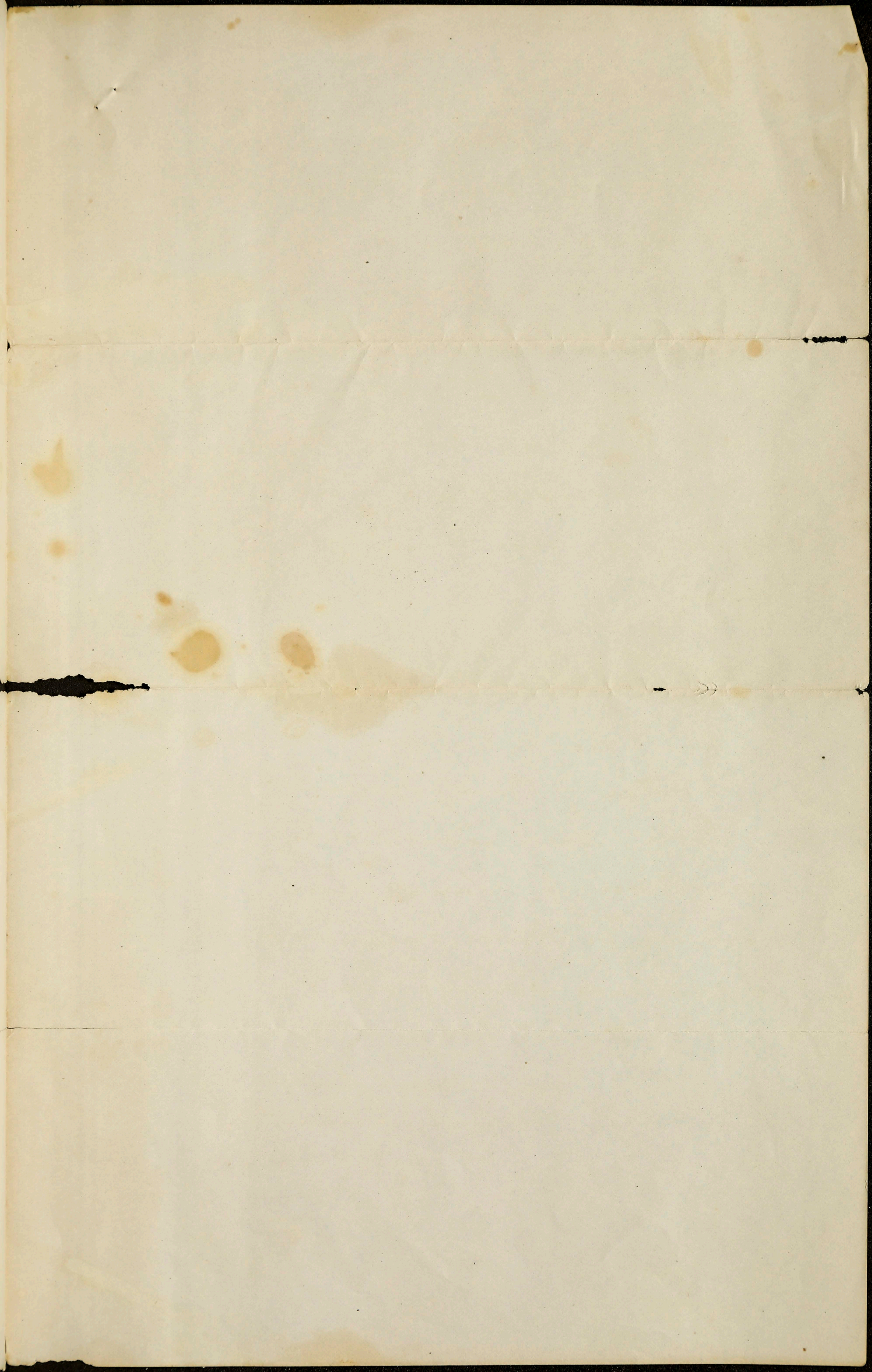

be attended with very con-
siderable expense, and of course will
still more embarrass the
Monetary Affairs of the
Province -
